"The Work of the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay" Guest Speaker: Kate Fritz, CEO of the Alliance April 19th, 2023

Our April guest speaker will visit us virtually to tell us about the important work that her organization, the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay (<u>https://www.allianceforthebay.org/</u>), does to help protect the Chesapeake Bay watershed. With offices in Maryland, Virginia, DC, and Pennsylvania, the ACB is a collaborative, inclusive, and data-driven organization that has sponsored many efforts such as reforestations, stream cleanup events, and agricultural management partnerships, while also itself receiving grants to help it further these works.

This past December, the Alliance was awarded about \$4,049,092 from the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation to help protect the Bay, across nine individual awards. The funding will allow for innovative clean water solutions through the Alliance's Forests, Agriculture, Green Infrastructure, and Stewardship and Engagement programs in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Washington DC, Delaware, West Virginia, and New York. In addition to the \$4 million received through the NFWF awards, the Alliance brings



\$4,729,901 million in matching funds from state, corporate, and foundations, plus community-sourced cost-share and in-kind services, to help the Bay. Come on out to learn more about these important Alliance initiatives, and how you may help!

About the Alliance: In 1971, a group of concerned citizens, representing business, agriculture, conservation, academia, and government began gathering to discuss the declining "state of the Bay" and a lack of political commitment to address it. Fifty years later, the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay is one of the oldest and well-respected non-profits working throughout the Chesapeake Bay watershed. The Alliance brings together communities, companies, and conservationists to improve our lands and waters. We envision clean streams and rivers flowing through resilient landscapes, cared for by the people who live, work, and play in the Chesapeake Bay watershed. The Alliance's focus areas are: forest management (1M+ trees planted), agricultural best practices (141 farms supported), green infrastructure improvements (\$10M of stormwater management installations), and environmental stewardship & civic engagement (over 700 community scientists are monitoring water quality).

About Kate:

Kate's interest in the Chesapeake Bay extends beyond her love of kayaking and fishing, and has led her to many volunteer opportunities locally. She is a certified Master Watershed Steward, and was a founding member of the Board of Directors for the Anne Arundel County Watershed Stewards Academy (WAS). As a believer in the linked nature of the environment and social issues, Kate has been an active leader with Anne Arundel Women's Giving Together, a women's giving circle, focused on women and family issues locally.



A River Reborn - Robert Kaiser

For those that missed it, this interesting film highlights the damage left by the legacy coal mines in Pennsylvania and how amazing it is to see it turned around, hence the title - A River Reborn.

As the Little Conemaugh River winds through the Allegheny Mountains of Pennsylvania, it forms the backbone of a region with a legacy of industrial might. And like a scribe, the river carries the weight of that history - mile after mile devoid of life, poisoned by toxic pollution from countless abandoned coal mines. Generations of residents and neighbors have turned their back on the river, believing the damage to be irreversible and scolding their children for playing in its orange waters. But a decade-long effort from a coalition of local groups has begun to reveal a different future for the Little Conemaugh and for other rivers in Pennsylvania and beyond. A River Reborn tells the story of the rebirth of the Little Conemaugh, and what it says about our ability to fix what might have been lost forever.

Patuxent Report - Jay Sheppard

On March 1 our stalwart volunteers float stocked about 1500 healthy brown trout into the upper Pax special area and into the flies only section below Brighton Dam. All reports were of very nice trout, some over 15"! Then a week later on March 8, the same number of rainbows were stocked in the same waters, as well as the Middle Patuxent River delayed harvest section in south Columbia.

The trout in the upper mainstem were stocked between rt 94 and Howard Chapel. None of the browns were intentionally dropped at the bridges, A short hike should get you to their initial stocking points. A couple hundred rainbows were dropped at each of the bridges.

There is a great cleared trail going upstream on the Howard Co. side of the Patuxent tailwater from Haviland Mill Road. Just park in the large county park lots just north of the bridge. There is a zig-zag trail along the Montgomery Co. side going downstream from the bridge and the small parking spaces there. Fishermen are allowed to walk cross the big meadow downstream of the bridge, courtesy of the owner, Sam Haviland. Please Note: this a NO PARKING area! At the downstream end of the meadow he has a ramp going down to a ford--easy access for fishers.

Many ask why so few trout are now being stocked in the Middle Patuxent these days. We are phasing out stockings on this lovely stream. The big issue is the continued development in the watershed. Impervious surfaces are increasing, which sends rain water going into the upper tribs quicker and in higher volumes. The watershed sits on an ancient sand pile from millions of years ago or so. Sand is bad for trout--little food produced for them. The siltation of the few large holes is the result. Not likely that development will slow or heal the runoff situation. To say we have been sand bagged into this problem...might be closer to the truth! Over the past few years we have seen virtually no trout after a week. Where they go is unknown, but they clearly do not find the delayed harvest section suitable. Stockings are no longer providing any meaningful recreational benefits to fishers after several days. Sad!

This is one of the reasons I have been pushing the Brighton tailwater fishery for the past decade. Until this year we had a problem with the turbines in the dam. When running, the water released gained no oxygen in the process. In summer we wanted to release the cold water at the bottom of Triadelphia Reservoir, but that cold water had almost no oxygen. Trout could not survive at that low level of oxygen, so we had no holdover trout. Now the hydro owner is no longer running the turbines, at least not in the summer. So we hope to see the trout surviving all summer below Brighton Dam. Fingers crossed!

Sulphur Dun

Its probably not too soon to be thinking about lining your fly boxes with some Sulphur patterns. Our friend Matt O'Neal of Savage Flies has a nice video showing and discussing a dun pattern.

One of many sulphur dun mayfly patterns, this one was created by George Harvey of Pennsylvania. Vary the body slightly to match the sulphurs in your area-- from pale yellow to a slightly more orange.
