Fish Passage Restoration - Sebastian Okelly

A fish passage restoration project is set for West Virginia, Virginia, and Maryland.


This project will implement 17 fish passage barrier removal projects, including dam removals and road-stream crossing replacements, to reconnect over 195 miles of habitat for brook trout and American eel in the headwaters of the Potomac Watershed across three states (WV, VA and MD).

The projects are in a watershed of high priority for aquatic connectivity restoration and will assist in the reconnection of a 150 square mile super patch for native brook trout and other aquatic wildlife. This project is part of the Potomac Headwaters River restoration efforts, which include an array of partners that have been working for over 15 years to reconnect high quality, limestone underlain, spring fed, brook trout patches.

How NOT to Ruin Your Fly Line- Scientific Anglers

Member Harry Steiner gave us this good tidbit of information. Thanks Harry!!!

Below is a link explaining how not to ruin your fly line by scientific anglers. Rio and other fly line manufacturers have similar opinions especially with the new coatings used by them. In earlier years manufactures like Cortland included cleaning and treatment pads with their lines. Cortland even stated you must treat their fly lines before and after every use. Most people did not know, read, or follow such instructions. They used other aftermarket non-fly lines treatment like Armor All and the like which was not recommended by the manufacturer. Most manufactures provide information on their website on how to care for their lines. With new coatings and materials, it is worth viewing their recommendations and explanations.

Patuxent Report - Jay Sheppard

One last stocking of the Delayed Harvest section on the Middle Patuxent in south Columbia was made on April 25. This stream is getting less and less suitable for trout. The bigger pools have largely filled in with sand, leaving little room for trout. Regrettably, we may need to review the stocking of this fishery with DNR as to its future.



The Brighton Dam tailwater still has good flows and temperatures. I do not expect any trout after the middle of June to survive. The Patuxent River simply receives 'dead' water from the turbines in mid-June. There is not enough oxygen in the water


to support the trout. The temperatures are fine, just no oxygen. We are still working on getting this fixed. Unfortunately, this has been frustratingly slow. We have pressured the regulatory agencies and the owners of the hydro project to get this fixed.

The upper Patuxent above Route 97 is fishing well for both wild and stocked browns. Just get away from any of the bridges to find the pools and pockets holding the fish. I had a report of some nice sized wild trout last month. They are there, but it takes patience and some skill to find and land one of those wild brownies over 14". You may not catch many trout, but the rewards are there for the exploring fisher who finds a couple of those brutes. Enjoy!



Tune-up Time - Mending Mechanics - Philip Monahan

To achieve a good mend, you've got to throw a certain portion of your line away from your fly. But getting your line to move up and down the river is harder than it sounds; most beginners end up dragging their flies underwater during the mend. To avoid this, you must lift the part of the fly line that you want to mend off the water, leaving the unmended portion of the line on the water.



There are five keys to a good mend:

- 1. Mend as soon as the fly touches down, before the line has time to bond to the water's surface. This will help you avoid dragging your fly under.
- 2. Begin the mend with your rod tip close to the surface of the water. If you have a bunch of slack hanging from your rod tip, all you'll end up moving is the slack, not the line on the water. You may have to make a couple of quick strips to pick up this slack before you mend.
- 3. The hinging point, where the mended line meets the unmended line, should occur at the seam between the different speed currents. If you don't mend enough line, the current will cause the line to drag the fly; if you mend too much line, you can accidentally pull your fly out of the trout's feeding lane.
- 4. Lift your rod tip high, even over your head, during the mend. This will allow you to pick up more line and to avoid dragging the line across the water.
- 5. Mend with authority. A half-hearted mend rarely moves enough line. You'll probably overmend the first few times accidentally throwing your fly upstream with the line but with some practice, you'll learn just how much power is needed to move the line you want to move without disturbing the fly.

Annual Supporting Contribution (ASC) - Jay Sheppard

September starts our annual cycle but now is a good time to consider making your Annual Supporting Contribution (ASC). As a Chapter we are not allowed to assess dues or fees for membership. - Support to TU fly fishing & conservation camps in Virginia and Pennsylvania, sponsoring attendance by high school students.
- Support of the Project Healing Waters program at Ft. Meade and Walter Reed that provides recreational activities to wounded warriors.
- Support the Mayfly Project for foster kids by being taught to fish and use fly rods.
- Free copies of the Conservationist for local fly shops, State agencies and other conservation organizations.
- Conservation projects that restore trout habitats in rivers & streams across Maryland.



To be clear, PPTU does receive a tiny amount back for members' annual dues to the national TU. This only totals a few hundred dollars annually. Your dues to national TU are separate and apart from any ASC, which is a voluntary donation to the chapter to help cover its expenses each year. PPTU does not mail renewal notices to anyone. If you see a renewal notice in the mail regarding TU, it is from the national offices. PPTU no longer handles renewals of national membership dues.

Red Tail Soft Hackle

Several discussion on the PPTU forum centered around this fly. We received two different videos for it so I'm including them both this time as it doesn't hurt to have options.

This fly can be fished unweighted by stripping in or just under the surface film like an emerger, or with weight*, it can be fished under an indicator.

*A heavier version can be tied by forming the rear half of the body by making touching wraps small red ultra wire from the rear to the mid-point of the body. From there, tie as shown in the video.
