"Winter Trout Fishing Techniques" Capt. Duber Winters October 16th, 2019

As we are now officially into Fall, we're happy to announce that our guest speaker for October is Capt. Duber Winters from <u>Duberfly.com</u>, who will be speaking with us about winter trout fishing techniques. Based in Annapolis, the staff at Duberfly.com teach fly casting and fly fishing, and also guide throughout the region in fresh and saltwater. Come on out to hear trout tips and techniques for when the temperature drops, that streamside cover may vanish with the falling leaves, and the fish may slow down.

About Capt. Duber Winters:

Duber hails from Southeastern Pennsylvania, where he grew up catching trout from mountain streams and smallmouth bass on the Susquehanna. His more-then-20-year career as a guide, Orvis store manager, author, and naturalist has equipped him with a wealth of knowledge about all aspects of both fresh and saltwater fly fishing.

Capt. Duber is an expert angler and fly-tier, a licensed captain, and a certified fly casting instructor. He spent more than a decade as a professional guide in Florida, where he led fly fishers of all experience levels to success landing saltwater fish such as tarpon, sailfish, snook, and permit-only species. In the Florida Keys, he joined the Orvis Company as a store manager and guide. He later worked for Orvis as a sales manager in Richmond, Va. and then as store manager in Woodbridge, Va.,

and Arlington, Va.—all the while conducting multiple guided trips each year across the US and overseas. He has taught many fly fishers in the greater Washington, DC, region the basics in his popular trout and bass schools. He currently continues to work as an independent guide based near Annapolis, Md.

Capt. Duber's work as a guide—and his own writing—has been featured in various books, newspapers, and magazines. He is actively involved in raising awareness about fly fishing and the environment through groups such as Project Healing Waters, Casting for Recovery, and a host of children's fishing organizations. His extensive experience working for anglers of all skill levels, combined with his likeable personality and appreciation for the sport's traditions, make him an ideal teacher and expedition partner. — *Karan Singh*

Patuxent Report - Jay Sheppard

Just an update on our efforts to get Brighton Dam to operate with sufficient Dissolved Oxygen (DO). When the turbines are running and water is coming from the bottom of the reservoir in the summer, there is no DO in the water that comes out from the turbines. Trout require 5 parts per thousand DO to survive. The river was running at about 1 ppt, at best, when the turbines operate in the summer.

PPTU is working with MD DNR, MDE, USFWS, and the owners of the dam (WSSC) and the hydro plant (Davis Hydro). We have an expert hydrologist from the Dept. of Energy, Oak Ridge Lab, in Tennessee advising us on how to fix this. The various options are not yet before us, but we expect some sort of structure to be built in the river below the dam that will oxygenate the water 24/7 and still survive the massive floods that periodically flush the river.

Our remaining problem is to find major funding for this construction. We are searching and hope to have a number of leads shortly. This all will take time. We cannot predict when everything will be in place to construct the structure or when it will be operational. It may be wishful thinking that we will be near completion a year from now.

Our long term goal is to have a sport fishery on the main Patuxent below Brighton Dam that provides year around opportunity for trout fishers. This is only a dozen miles or so from either beltway. We do not expect a wild trout fishery like the Gunpowder, as the Patuxent here simply does not have the requirements for major spawning and rearing of little Further, the reservoir is relatively small trout. compared to Prettyboy. We anticipate that during severe droughts there may not be sufficient cold water even at reduced flows. So maybe once every decade we may lose most of the trout during a hot, dry summer. WSSC is still working on repairs to the dam. They hope to be finished sometime this coming winter. That means we may be able to resume spring stockings, but holdovers are unlikely over next summer. Stay tuned.

It has been a long process to get here, but we are happy to report that we have received all our trail permits and we have final approval to begin construction in the upstream Phase 1 area!! We will be sending out additional details in the coming days, but our Patuxent Upstream volunteer kickoff is planned for Saturday, 10/5, 9am-1pm.

Flybrary by Castaway Customs - Sean Beck

You arrive at the stream with a plan and a smile. Off to the side is an angler who just came off the water and has an open fly box and is placing some of his flies onto a board. You strike up a conversation and walk away with a few flies that worked when nothing else would that day.

This is the type of interaction that the creators of the Flybrary, Castaway Customs, hoped for when they came up with the idea. "Have one? Leave one. Need one? Take one." A new way for anglers to share patterns with each other, the Flybrary allows local anglers to hone in what works and what does not with each other face-to-face on the water. They are popping up with regularity across the States and even internationally. Here in Maryland you can find them at popular streams like the Gunpowder River and Morgan Run. I recently added one to the Middle Patuxent River at the Eden Brook Rd access point using a premade patch from Castaway Customs. I have also crafted one from craft store cork and cedar lumber which will be placed at the Howard Chapel Rd access to the Upper Patuxent. Flybraries can be as simple or complex as you like.

While the Flybrary is a cool project on its own, we can extend its use to new member recruitment for PPTU. Many anglers do not know we exist, and a sticker or a URL engraving next to one of these is all

it takes to spread awareness. You can get a free kit like the one I placed on the Middle Patuxent from Castaway Customs. Cedar and nails are cheap, and I have lots of excess waiting to be used. Scout out potential locations for new Flybraries on various Maryland streams and we can work together to spread the PPTU message of conservation and clean water while also making the angling community more friendly.

MD Fall Trout Stocking - MD DNR

Trout hatchery staff are busy preparing for the fall trout stocking program that begins this month. The stockings will be posted on the trout stocking website after they occur and are subject to changes due to flow conditions in rivers, streams or creeks.

Staff report that the rainbow trout to be stocked are going to be **larger than usual** and they expect to stock approximately 26,000 trout for you to enjoy. Several trophy-sized spring "holdovers" in the three-pound range will also be stocked. Get your gear together, check those waders and boots for leaks and get ready for some exciting fishing fun in a trout management water near you.
