Steelhead and Salmon Fishing in Upstate New York October 15, 2008

His talk will also cover the major Lake Erie and Lake Ontario tributaries and where to focus your fishing efforts. Dan will also discuss the right equipment to use and the flies that he has had the most success with. And, if you need help finding a guide, Dan has several to recommend **or** sign up with Dennis Covert for our Steelhead outing in November. Either way you must get a taste for this fishing this fall. November Fundraiser

This event also raises funds that are essential to continue our tree planting and habitat work on some of our local streams!

PPTU's Grand Prize Raffle this year includes a **First Prize** of a trip for two on the Delaware River at the West Branch Angler. A Couple of Reasons to Tie Flies

In the years during which I have been one of the instructors in our PPTU annual tying class, more than one person has asked me to explain why I get so much enjoyment out of tying trout flies. It really is an interesting question, and its answer has many facets.

I am not going to delve into reasons to avoid tying. Believe me, there are some, just ask my wife. I do, however, wish to mention a few reasons that make me want to tie, and then tell a short anecdote that will help explain.

The major reason I tie is to catch more fish. That said, I cannot ignore the fact my ego doesn't suffer when my friends who do not tie assume that because I tie flies I know more than they do about the sport, even if down deep I know it is seldom true. But wait... to be a good tyer you do need to study bugs more than you did before, and you do need to study what fish feed on in order to tie flies they will eat. Could it be my friends are more insightful than I first thought? Might tying make you a better fly fisher? Tying does satisfy a creative urge. I know I am not the village artist, but still, when I come up with a variation on a pattern that looks good and works well. I feel pretty good about it. There truly is a special sense of accomplishment involved in catching trout on flies you have tied yourself.

A few years back a bunch of us traveled to Jim Kiel's dad's hunting cabin near State College to fish the sulphur hatch on Spring Creek. On that afternoon we carried portable radios to keep in touch and announce what was working on the water and what was not. For the first hour it was rather slow, with only a rise or two and an occasional take. Then the action picked up and sulphurs began popping off the water and fish started rising everywhere we looked. The trouble was none of us could get any of the rising fish to take a fly. Since the sulphurs had been hatching for days, there was a mix of different sized spinners, emergers, and duns on the water.

When I am in that situation, I love trying to solve the puzzle. Ask anyone who knows me, and they will tell you I carry far too many flies, but I do it for days like that one. I carry flies I tied ten years ago and might have only used once. This day I tried almost every sulphur pattern I carried. My fly patch was nearly full, and then I stumbled across the key. Of course! Instead of a rusty spinner they usually take, these fish wanted a yellow bodied spinner with cream hackle wings. After I tied on that pattern, I caught nice fish on almost every cast. Thanks to the radios, the others then started catching more fish, too.

After a half hour or so of that, my chuckles on the radio waves prompted folks to head back to the car where I broke into the fly inventory box I carry to refill my vest. I can remember more than one smile as I handed everyone a few #12 or #14 sulphur spinners tied with split microfibett tails, sulphur yellow turkey biot bodies, and oversized cream, wound hackle spent wings. That was one of the best days I have ever enjoyed on Spring Creek, with many more fish than I had ever caught in an afternoon before. I guess you could say days like that are really good reasons to tie.

If I have piqued your curiosity – good! See the ad about our annual tying class in this issue of "The Conservationist" or on our web site. Give it a try, and find a new way to expand your horizons. Maybe you will have as much fun as I do.

DNR expects to have some trout available for fall stockings, but as we go to press we do not have the stocking schedule. Check the DNR web site for the fall stocking reports or watch on the PPCTU list serve.

ANNUAL WARNING: Hunting goes through mid-winter in many sections of Patuxent River State Park, so be careful and stay alert. The firearm season for deer is still a way off, but squirrel hunting starts the first Saturday of October, and dove and archery season for deer will both be continuing as this is mailed. Suggest fishing on weekdays or Sundays; otherwise, wear a bright-colored hat on Saturdays, in particular. Sunday hunting for deer does not apply on public hunting zones, such as the Patuxent River State Park.


Tying Flies for Trout

FOR THE NOVICE OR INTERMEDIATE FLY TYER

Tying Flies for Trout is designed for the novice and intermediate tyer who wishes to learn new tying skills or improve the techniques they already have. The basic skills and materials for tying nymphs, emergers, duns, and spinners, coupled with basic wet fly and streamer construction will be covered. The class focus will be on proven local patterns. Jim Greco, Dave Wittman, Robert Simpson, Carl Smolka, and Larry Vawter will conduct the class. The class will be at the Schweinhaut Senior Center, 1000 Forest Glen Road, Silver Spring, MD, from 7 to 9 PM on Tuesday nights: January 6, 13, 20, 27, February, 3, 10, 2009.

Tuition for this 6 week class is \$115.00. For TU members who have made a \$20.00 Annual Supporting Contribution (ASC) to PPTU a discount of \$20.00 applies, making the tuition only \$95.00. The tuition fee covers the room rental, class handouts, and tying materials for flies to be tied in the class with the balance of revenue going to the PPTU Chapter for use in its education and conservation efforts. Right now, joining National TU costs only \$17.50 (which is only \$2.50 more if you elect to be assigned to PPTU – ask Jim) which will also include the PPTU ASC, and entitles you to the \$20.00 discount and other benefits associated with it.
